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# STREET OUTREACH HOMELESS CATEGORY 1(i)

Homeless Category 1(i), Literally Homeless

- 1. Lacks a fixed, regular and adequate nighttime residence...
- (i) has a primary nighttime residence that is a public or private place not meant for human habitation;

   (iii) Is exiting an institution where (s)he has resided for 90 days
- (iii) Is exiting an institution where (s)he has resided for 90 days or less <u>and</u> who resided in an emergency shelter or place not meant for human habitation immediately before entering that institution

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### EMERGENCY SHELTER HOMELESS CATEGORY 1

- (1) "An individual or family who lacks a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence..."
- (i) Not meant for human habitation; or
- (ii) Public/private shelter; or
- (iii) Exiting institution where stayed 90 days or less and homeless before entry.

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# EMERGENCY SHELTER HOMELESS CATEGORY 1 FOR YOUTH IN FOSTER CARE

• ESG cannot serve youth who are currently wards of the state, including youth in foster care, juvenile justice and health care systems.

# EMERGENCY SHELTER HOMELESS CATEGORY 1 FOR YOUTH IN FOSTER CARE (con't)

- Youth exiting foster care are not homeless under Category 1 if they:
  - Have been in foster care more than 90 days; and
  - Were not living on the street or in an emergency shelter prior to entering foster care.

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# EMERGENCY SHELTER HOMELESS CATEGORY 2

- 24 CFR §576.2, paragraph (2) of "homeless":
- "(2) An individual or family who will imminently lose their primary nighttime residence, provided that"...
  - Will lose housing in 14 days;
  - No other housing identified; and
  - No other resources or support.

### EMERGENCY SHELTER HOMELESS CATEGORY 2 FOR YOUTH EXITING FOSTER CARE

- Youth exiting foster care are not Homeless under Category 2:
  - Even if they are within 14 days of discharge.
  - Even if they have not identified a subsequent residence.

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# EMERGENCY SHELTER HOMELESS CATEGORY 3

- 24 CFR §576.2, paragraph (3) of "homeless":
- "(3) Unaccompanied youth under 25 years of age, or families with children and youth, who do not otherwise qualify as homeless under this definition, but who..."
  - (i) Meets definitions listed in other statutes; and
  - (ii) Not had lease or housing agreement in 60 days; and
  - (iii) Moved two or more times in 60 days; and
  - (iv) Will continue with housing instability because of a list of reasons (continued on next slide)

# EMERGENCY SHELTER HOMELESS CATEGORY 3 (con't)

(iv)Will continue with housing instability because of a list of reasons\*:

- One of these:
  - chronic disabilities, chronic physical health or mental health conditions, substance addiction, histories of domestic violence or childhood abuse (including neglect), the presence of a child or youth with a disability; or
- Two of these:
  - barriers to employment, which include the lack of a high school degree or General Education Development (GED), illiteracy, low English proficiency, a history of incarceration or detention for criminal activity, and a history of unstable employment.

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### EMERGENCY SHELTER HOMELESS CATEGORY 3 EXAMPLE

Andrew is 17 and receives a referral from his school that he meets the McKinney Vento definition of homelessness. He certifies that he has not had a lease in 60 days and two of his friends sign statements that Andrew stayed with them over the last 60 days. Plus, he is expected to remain homeless because he will not return to his parents due to abuse at home.

### EMERGENCY SHELTER HOMELESS CATEGORY 3 FOR YOUTH EXITING FOSTER CARE

- Youth exiting foster care may meet Category 3 of Homeless if:
  - The youth is under the age of 25;
  - The youth meets another federal definition of homeless;
  - The youth has not had a lease, ownership interest, or occupancy agreement in permanent housing during the 60 days prior to the homeless assistance application;
  - The youth has experienced persistent instability as measured by two moves or more during the preceding 60 days; and
  - The youth can be expected to continue in such status for an extended period of time due to special needs or barriers.

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# EMERGENCY SHELTER HOMELESS CATEGORY 4

#### "(4) Any individual or family who:

- (i) Is fleeing, or is attempting to flee, domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, stalking, or other dangerous or lifethreatening conditions that relate to violence ..." AND
- (ii) Has no other residence identified; AND
- (iii) Lacks support networks.



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#### **RAPID RE-HOUSING**

- Homeless Category 1(i)-(iii), Literally Homeless
  - No income requirement at intake
  - Recertify with income requirement annually
- Homeless Category 4, Fleeing Domestic Violence
  - No income requirement at intake
  - Recertify with income requirement annually

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

- Same definition as Emergency Shelter for:
  - Homeless Category 2(i)-(iii) Imminent Risk
  - Homeless Category 3(i)-(iv) Homeless Under Federal Statutes
  - Homeless Category 4(i)-(iii) Fleeing Domestic Violence
- Plus:
  - Need to be below 30% AMFI to enter program

#### PREFERENCE OF HOMELESS DOCUMENTATION

- Subrecipient procedures must establish order of priority for obtaining evidence as:
  - Third-party documentation (best)
  - Intake worker documentation (second best)
  - Certification from person seeking assistance (third best)
- 24 CFR §576.500(b)

# HOMELESS MANAGEMENT INFORMATION SYSTEM (HMIS) OR COMPARABLE DATABASE USE AS DOCUMENTATION

- Records in HMIS or comparable database are acceptable third-party documentation/intake worker observations:
- Can be used if HMIS retains an auditable history of all entries, including
- the person who entered the data,
- the date of entry, and
- the change made;
- Can be used if the HMIS prevents overrides or changes of the dates on which entries are made.
- 24 CFR §576.500(b)

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# HOMLESS 1(i) LITERALLY HOMELESS

- 1. Lacks a fixed, regular and adequate nighttime residence...
  - (i) not meant for human habitation.
- Eligible for Street Outreach, Emergency Shelter and Rapid Re-housing

### HOMLESS 1(ii) LITERALLY HOMELESS

- 1. "An individual or family who lacks a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence..."
  - (ii) Public/private shelter;
- Eligible for Emergency Shelter and Rapid Re-housing

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### HOMLESS 1(i) AND (ii) – LITERALLY HOMELESS RECORD KEEPING

- Record keeping
  - Written observation by outreach worker; or
  - Written referral by housing or service provider\*; or
  - Certification by client.
- No verification of income for Street Outreach or Emergency Shelter or Services
- Rapid Re-housing = need to recertify in one year with income certification below 30% AMFI
  - \*HUD monitoring of TDHCA determined that Child Protective Services (CPS) paperwork is not an acceptable source of referral for the Homeless definition.

### HOMLESS 1(iii) LITERALLY HOMELESS

- (1) "An individual or family who lacks a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence..."
  - (iii) Exiting institution where stayed 90 days or less and homeless before entry
- Eligible for Emergency Shelter, and Rapid Re-housing

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# HOMLESS 1(iii) – LITERALLY HOMELESS RECORD KEEPING

- (iii) Record keeping
  - Written observation by outreach worker; or
  - Written referral by housing or service provider; or
  - · Certification by client; and
  - Discharge paperwork or written or oral referral from social worker stating beginning and end dates of stay; or
  - Due diligence to obtain discharge paperwork and client certification that they exited an institution.

### HOMELESS 2 IMMINENT RISK OF HOMELESSNESS

- 24 CFR §576.2, paragraph (2) of "homeless":
- "(2) An individual or family who will imminently lose their primary nighttime residence, provided that"...
  - Will lose housing in 14 days; and
  - · No other housing identified; and
  - No other resources or support.
- Eligible for Emergency Shelter, and Homelessness Prevention (under 30% AMFI)

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# HOMELESS 2 – IMMINENT RISK OF HOMELESSNESS **RECORD KEEPING**

- Court order or equivalent notice with 14 days to vacate; or
- Evidence that client lacks the resources for motel/hotel for 14 days; and
- Oral statement by client:
  - Has to move in 14 days; and
  - Oral statement verified by intake worker; or
  - Due diligence to verify client's oral statement; and
- Certification by client that there's no other residence; and;
- Certification by client or documentation of lack of resources or supports; and
- Has income below 30% AMFI (only for Homelessness Prevention)

  - (i) Meets definitions listed in other statutes; and
  - (ii) Not had lease or housing agreement in 60 days; and
  - (iii) Moved two or more times in 60 days; and
  - (iv) Will continue with housing instability because of specific listed reason(s)
- Eligible for Emergency Shelter; Homelessness Prevention (under 30% AMFI)

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# HOMELESS 3 – HOMELESS UNDER OTHER FEDERAL STATUTES RECORD KEEPING

- \*\*\*Intake observation is not appropriate\*\*\*
- (3)(i) Meets definitions in other statutes
  - Certification by local entity administering other homeless programs; and
    - Other statutes include: the Runaway and Homeless Youth Act, the Head Start Act, Violence Against Women Act, Public Health Service Act, the Food and Nutrition Act, Child Nutrition Act, or McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act, as applicable;
    - Documentation:
      - referral from a provider of shelter or housing, or social worker, case worker, or other appropriate
        official of a hospital or institution in which the individual or family resided;
      - or, a written record of the intake worker's due diligence in attempting to obtain these statements or records.

### HOMELESS 3 – HOMELESS UNDER OTHER FEDERAL STATUTES RECORD KEEPING

- (3)(ii) Has not had lease or rental agreement in 60 days
  - Referral by a housing or service provider; or
  - Written observation by an outreach worker; or
  - Certification by Program Participant or head of household; and
- (3)(iii) Moved two or more times in 60 days
  - · Certification by client or head of household; and
  - Supporting documentation or due diligence to obtain docs; and

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# HOMELESS 3 – HOMELESS UNDER OTHER FEDERAL STATUTES RECORD KEEPING (con't)

- (3)(iv) Will continue with housing instability because of a list of reasons.
  - One of these:
    - chronic disabilities, chronic physical health or mental health conditions, substance addiction, histories of domestic violence\* or childhood abuse (including neglect), the presence of a child or youth with a disability; or
  - Two of these:
    - barriers to employment, which include the lack of a high school degree or General Education Development (GED), illiteracy, low English proficiency, a history of incarceration or detention for criminal activity, and a history of unstable employment.
  - · Written diagnosis by licensed professional; or
  - Intake staff observations confirmed in 45 days by professional; or
  - Other documentation showing reason for housing instability; and
- Has income below 30% AMFI (only for Homelessness Prevention)

<sup>\*</sup>Domestic Violence can certify that they were fleeing the situation.

### HOMELESS 3 – HOMELESS UNDER OTHER FEDERAL STATUTES **EXAMPLE**

- Verification of Homelessness Status:
  - Chris has two children and has a letter from a social worker stating homeless status under Child Nutrition Act.
- Housing status:
  - Chris certifies:
    - No permanent housing in the last 60 days
    - Moved two or more times in the past 60 days.
  - Intake worker calls two friends to verify.
- Barriers:
  - Chris certifies:
    - lacks a GED
    - a history of incarceration.
  - Intake staff verifies Chris' school and prison records.

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# HOMELESS 4 FLEEING DOMESTIC VIOLENCE

- "(4) Any individual or family who:
- (i) Is fleeing, or is attempting to flee, domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, stalking, or other dangerous or life-threatening conditions that relate to violence ..." and
- (ii) Has no other residence identified; and
- (iii) Lacks support networks.
- Eligible for Emergency Shelter, Rapid Re-housing, and Homelessness Prevention.

### HOMELESS 4 – FLEEING DOMESTIC VIOLENCE **RECORD KEEPING**

### For victim service provider:

- Oral Statement by client:
  - Fleeing violence; and
  - No other residence; and
  - No sufficient resources or supports; and
  - Statement is self-certified or intake worker certifies; and
- Income below 30% AMFI (Homelessness Prevention).

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# HOMELESS 4 – FLEEING DOMESTIC VIOLENCE RECORD KEEPING (con't)

#### For non-victim service provider:

- Oral Statement by client:
  - Fleeing violence; and
  - No other residence; and
  - No sufficient resources or supports; and
  - Statement is self-certified by individual or head of household; and
- If safe:
  - intake worker verifies statement; or
  - Referral by a housing or service provider, social worker, legal assistance provider, healthcare provider, law enforcement agency, legal assistance provider, pastoral counselor, or any other organization from whom the individual or head of household has sought assistance for domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, or stalking; and
- Income below 30% AMFI (Homelessness Prevention).

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#	Question	Answer
1	Clients may have support networks, but it is not safe. This would still make them eligible?	If the person has support networks that are not safe, that support network is invalid.
2	How often does Income have to be recertified for HP? I thought I heard you say monthly, but I thought I t was every 3 months.	For Homelessness Prevention income must be reevaluated not less than once every three months per 24 CFR §576.401(b).
3	If we have all our clients are coming from Coordinated Entry, is that good enough to verify that they are homeless for RRH?	Not necessarily. Coordinated Entry is different across the state and the process may not verify homeless status. If the Coordinated Entry process does verify homeless status, keep in mind that documentation of eligibility must be keep in your agency's files.
4	So since they have been in motel for five days and the question says can only pay for 10 more daysThe screen before says evidence that client lacks the resources for motel/hotel for 14 days. I'm confused because in the scenario given it is 15 days. Can you clarify?	Per 24 CFR §576.2, Homeless Category 2 states "an individual or family who will imminently lose their primary nighttime residence, provided that: (i) The primary nighttime residence will be lost within 14 days of the application for homeless assistance; (ii) No subsequent residence has been identified; and (iii) The individual or family lacks the resources or support networks, e.g., family, friends, faith-based or other social networks, needed to obtain other permanent housing". For individuals and families whose primary nighttime residence is a hotel or motel room paid by them, you need evidence that the individual or family lacks the resources necessary to reside there for more than 14 days after the date of application for homeless assistance. They could have been in the hotel/motel for more than 14 days, but to qualify they must be losing their residence within 14 days of the date of application for homeless assistance.
5	For street outreach, how long after the SO worker gets someone into a shelter do they have to stop working with them?	Once a Program Participant is being assisted at the shelter, he/she is no longer eligible for assistance under the street outreach activity. This person would then be eligible for assistance under the emergency shelter activity.
6	Are there different record keeping requirements for programs that only serve youth ages 18-24 (i.e. for emergency shelter or Rapid Re-Housing)?	The recordkeeping requirements covered during this webinar are applicable to programs that only serve youth. Youth may qualify under different definitions of homeless/at-risk of homelessness than adults, but these definitions were also covered during this webinar.
