Appendix D: Youth Count Texas! Summary of Survey Results

The following briefly describes the process for combining data from across sites for initial data collection.

Data were collected by Child and Family Research Partnership at the University of Texas (CFRP) and Texas Network of Youth Services (TNOYS) from local CoC lead agencies and other Youth Count implementers participating in *YCT!*. Local CoCs worked individually with CFRP to determine data delivery preferences in which data would be shared securely. Options for CoCs to share local-level data included, 1) using an online Qualtrics survey developed by CFRP to directly enter local survey data, in which CFRP would be able to directly download the data, 2) uploading files (either PDFs of scanned surveys or raw, local-level excel data files) to a secure, password-protected server, or 3) mailing in paper surveys for CFRP to organize into an electronic data file. If the CoCs chose an option that provided CFRP with copies of surveys, CFRP staff entered the surveys into Qualtrics and downloaded the local data from the server.¹

A total of 1,007 surveys were received from communities across the state. Duplicates were removed by CFRP for a reduced sample of 913 which was provided to the University of Houston, Graduate College of Social Work for data analysis. A total of 155 cases were removed by UH GCSW because they did not meet eligibility criteria i.e. there was no data on age (n=69), the age exceeded 24 (n=25), or the person had spent the prior night in a stable housing situation (n=61). The maximum sample size in final analysis is 758.

The number of respondents varies for each question asked because different communities administered different versions of the survey. Below are descriptive results for the items asked in the 2 page version of the survey overall, and compared by age (under 19 vs. 19-24). Footnotes in the table are provided to indicate which communities were missing if a question was not included in that community.
